Subject: Large Majority of Pennsylvania Voters Are Following the January 6th Investigation And See Trump Loyalists As the Problem, Not Just Trump


A new Public Policy Polling survey finds that a large majority (78%) of Pennsylvania voters have seen, heard, or read a lot or some about the investigation by the U.S. House of Representatives into what happened on January 6th and the events leading up to it. Pennsylvanians also show support for the investigation by a 12-point margin (52-40).

A majority (60%) consider the events on January 6th and the effort to overturn elections to be a problem. More than half (51%) of voters consider the problem to not only be Donald Trump, but also members of the Republican Party who are loyalists to Trump. Just 9% of voters consider Trump to be the only problem. This is also true among key independent voters—54% think the problem is also with Trump loyalists in the Republican Party, while just 4% think the problem is only with Trump.

Voters also express major concerns over several issues uncovered by the January 6th investigation and hearings:

- 68% are concerned (with 54% saying they have very serious concerns) about Trump demanding that Mike Pence overturn the election result for him even after White House lawyers told him it was illegal.
- 64% are concerned (with 51% very concerned) about Trump and his allies deciding
 to tell people there was voter fraud in the 2020 election, even after some of
 Trump's lawyers and the Attorney General told them there was no widespread
 fraud.
- 62% are concerned (with 48% very concerned) about Trump using the false claims about the election results to raise hundreds of millions of dollars for his campaigns and businesses.
- 61% are concerned (with 50% very concerned) about Trump and his team repeatedly pressuring local election officials in key states to find the votes needed to change the outcome of the election.
- 61% are concerned (with 47% very concerned) about several of the Republican members of Congress who worked with the Trump team subsequently seeking pardons from the Trump administration because they were worried they had committed crimes.

Public Policy Polling surveyed 582 Pennsylvania voters from June 28-29, 2022. The margin of error is \pm 4.1%. 67% of interviews for the survey were conducted by text message and 33% by telephone.
