


Press Briefing July 22nd, 2022


Eighty-six percent of voters have heard a lot or some about the Congressional Investigation into January 6^{th} with six-in-ten having heard a lot about the investigation. Across parties, the vast majority of voters are aware of the investigation.


How much have you seen, heard or read about the Congressional investigation into January 6th?





Voters have become much more aware of the Congressional investigation over the last few months with intensity greatly increasing.








Almost two-thirds of voters support the House Committee investigation of January 6th, with more than half strongly supporting. Sixty-two percent of independents also support the investigation, with about half of independents strongly supporting the committee. Almost a third of Republicans support the committee. One-in-five Republicans strongly support the committee investigation.





Majorities of voters reject passive or positive descriptions of Trump Republicans involved in January 6th like "patriots" or "bystanders."










Voters are more likely to think that the Republican Party is more inclined to resort to violence than the Democratic Party. Independents are much more likely to think that Republicans are inclined to resort to violence than Democrats.

Do you agree or disagree with the following statement?


People who support the <u>Democratic Party</u> are inclined to resort to violence when they're pushing their agenda or worldview.

More than 70% of independents find statements about the January 6th hearing revelations concerning. Between 38%-49% of Republicans also see these findings as concerning.



Almost 60% of voters overall are concerned about a future January 6th-like attack on our country. This includes the vast majority of Democrats and Surge voters. Half of independents and about one-third of Republicans are concerned for future attacks.

How concerned are you about potential future attacks on our country like what happened on January 6th?



More than two-thirds of voters say they would not vote for anyone who supported and encouraged the January 6th attack including a 60% majority who feel that way strongly. Almost all Democrats as well as 73% of independents agree. Republicans are almost evenly split on this issue.

To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statement: I would not vote for anyone who supported or encouraged the attack on our country on January 6th



Two-thirds of voters agree with not voting for anyone who supported or encouraged the January 6th attack by attempting to overturn the 2020 election results. This includes 63% of independents and 32% of Republicans.
